Social work is committed to facilitating and promoting self-reliant individuals, sustainable group practices and an egalitarian and undivided society through the science of teaching and the art of doing. With the early moorings in social service traditions and organized social welfare, social work has evolved to cater the changing needs of society in the wake of industrialization, urbanization and obtuse development. It marked its presence to provide specialized services to individuals, groups and communities.

ISWC AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

ISWC 2025 aims to bring together academicians, practitioners, policymakers, and industry leaders to foster interdisciplinary dialogues on the interplay between technology, innovation, and society in advancing sustainable development. It will serve as a platform for exchange of knowledge, showcase best practices, and co-create strategies that bridge gaps between technology, sustainable development goals and social work profession in Indian context. The participants of the conference should send a paper engaging at least one component of the given theme and sub-themes.

THEME AND SUB-THEMES

The main theme for the 13th Indian Social Work Conference (ISWC) 2025 is **Technology**, **Innovation**, **and Society: Ecosocial Work and Sustainable Development**, which underscores the pivotal role of technological advancements and innovative paradigms in fostering economic betterment, environmental sustainability and societal well-being. In an era dominated by the Anthropocene, where climate change, ecological degradation, and socio-economic inequalities are interwoven into the fabric of global challenges, the integration of innovative technology, ecosocial work principles and sustainable development offer transformative possibilities for equitable and resilient futures especially for the Viksit Bharat.

Technology, as an enabler of societal progress, has revolutionized traditional approaches to problem-solving, particularly in areas of community empowerment, resource disaster mitigation, and environmental conservation. technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI), blockchain, and the Internet of Things (IoT) have demonstrated significant potential in advancing sustainable practices. In 2024, technology and innovation reports highlighted the rise of AI, the importance of social entrepreneurship, and the global focus on innovation, with India securing 39th position in the Global Innovation Index. However, the adoption and application of such technologies must transcend technical efficiency to embody ethical, equitable, and ecological considerations in a wide array of diverse social, economic and cultural systems of Odisha and India. Along with technology, innovation lies at the heart of sustainable development, offering novel solutions to entrenched environmental and social challenges. While technology and innovation hold promise, they also pose ethical and societal challenges, including issues of access, equity, and ecological impact.

The digital divide, algorithmic biases, and techno-centric interventions risk perpetuating social inequities in a highly populated and diversified society like India. There can be no denial to critically engage with these dimensions, advocating for inclusive and participatory frameworks that democratize technology for marginalized communities. It will also reflect on the ethical imperatives of technological deployments in ecosocial work, ensuring that interventions prioritize ecological justice and community agency. Ecosocial work integrates ecological concerns with social justice frameworks, emphasizing the interconnectedness of human and environmental well-being.

In the context of ecosocial work, innovation encompasses both technological advancements and indigenous knowledge systems. By aligning its principles with the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, ecosocial work provides actionable pathways to achieve SDGs such as Reduce Poverty (SDG 1), Good health and Well-Being (SDG 3), Gender Equality (SDG 5), Climate Action (SDG 13), Clean Water and Sanitation (SDG 6), and Reduced Inequalities (SDG 10).

ISWC 2025 intends to explore the multifaceted intersections of technology with societal structures, focusing on its role as a catalyst for ecosocial work-a discipline committed to environmental justice and community-centric development. Discussions will focus on renewable energy technologies, circular economy practices, sustainable urbanization, and community-led conservation initiatives. It will also delve into how grassroots innovations, coupled with cutting-edge technologies, can foster adaptive capacities, build resilience, and promote inclusive participation in sustainability efforts. Like every year, this ISWC also make efforts to discuss and deliberate on the theoretical and practical dimensions of ecosocial work in addressing environmental inequalities, enhancing disaster preparedness, and fostering socio-ecological harmony.

CALL FOR PAPERS

We invite participants to send their abstracts and research-based papers for **Oral** and **Poster** presentation. An abstract must include the central thrust of the paper, methodology and findings and should be within 250-500 words (12 Times New Roman font size with 1.5 line spacing). The size of the full paper should be within 5000-7000 words with APA 7th referencing style. The abstract has to be submitted through the online portal (https://napswi.org/conf) at the time of registration only.

Once an abstract is selected, the participant shall be communicated to send their full paper to the conference mail id. The full paper should fall under any of the sub-themes and in the subject of the e-mail, the concerned sub-theme must be written. A book of abstracts shall be published. The last date of registration and submission of abstract is 30th August, 2025.

CONFERENCE VENUE

BEST RESEARCH PAPERS AND POSTER

Research scholars, faculty members and practitioners are encouraged to develop theoretically embedded research papers. **5 best research papers** and **5 best posters** shall be selected on the basis of quality of presentation and peer review report on full paper. The first author/paper presenter of each such paper/poster shall be awarded with a certificate and provided travel assistance/logistics support up to 5000 rupees (on the production of valid bills) as token of appreciation and recognition.

NGO AND CORPORATE MEET

A dedicated platform will be established to facilitate consultations between NGOs and Corporates, fostering impactful partnerships for the betterment of society and ecosocial practice. This exclusive session aims to bridge the gap between CSR initiatives and grassroots development efforts, ensuring long-term sustainability. Industry leaders, CSR heads, and NGO representatives will come together to engage in meaningful discussions, exchange best practices, and explore collaborative projects aligned with national development priorities and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

PLENARY SESSIONS

Plenary sessions will feature invited experts from academia, practice, and the broader field. These sessions will focus on four key thematic areas: Social Work Education; Ecosocial Work and Sustainable Development; Technology, Innovation, and Inclusive Society; and the Linkage between CSR, CSOs, and Social Work for the Empowerment of Marginalized Communities.
