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THE 14TH ISWC– A BACKDROP

The 14th Indian Social Work Conference (ISWC) 2026 brings together a significant academic and professional gathering, organized by the National Association of Professional Social Workers in India (NAPSWI) in collaboration with partner organization – The Department of Social Work, Royal School of Humanities & Social Sciences (RSHSS), The Assam Royal Global University (RGU), Guwahati. Following the legacy of the 13th conference held in Bhubaneswar, this edition transitions to the North-East for the very first time at The Assam Royal Global University (RGU), Guwahati.

Keeping up with the concept of 'Viksit Bharat' (Developed India) that advocates for a shift from the traditional 'Welfare' approach to a comprehensive 'Wellbeing' framework, the theme for the 14th ISWC is 'From Welfare to Wellbeing: Reimagining Social Work Practice with the vision of Viksit Bharat @2047'. This reimagined approach emphasises quality of life, mental health resilience, and the integration of technology to ensure that progress is equitable and sustainable for all citizens. We are delighted to invite academicians, researchers, practitioners, students and social work professionals to be part of this historic experience to discuss and deliberate a range of important issues concerning the announced theme.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- To provide a forum for social work professionals, academicians, and practitioners to redefine social work interventions in the context of a developing India (Viksit Bharat).
- To explore the shift from a service-delivery welfare approach to holistic human wellbeing.
- To foster collaboration between social workers, government bodies, and technical experts to address emerging social challenges.
- To document evidence-based practices that contribute to national prosperity and social justice.

ABOUT THEME AND SUB-THEMES

From Welfare to Wellbeing: Reimagining Social Work Practice for Viksit Bharat @2047

Professional social work has evolved significantly over the past century—from its roots in charitable service to becoming a globally recognized academic discipline and practice-based profession. Since the establishment of formal social work education in the early twentieth century, the profession has progressed through successive paradigms of welfare, development, rights-based approaches, empowerment, and, ultimately, wellbeing.

Early pioneers of social work emphasized different dimensions of the profession. Mary Richmond (1917) viewed social work as facilitating conscious adjustments between individuals and their environments to foster personality development. Walter Friedlander (1955) highlighted the application of scientific knowledge and human relations skills to achieve personal and social satisfaction, while Gisela Konopka (1958) emphasised the integration of social services, methods, and social policy. Herbert Stroup (1960) described social work as the art of applying scientific methods to assist individuals, groups, and communities. Over time, the profession has strengthened its humanitarian and scientific foundations while embracing innovation, technological advancement, and evidence-based practice.

The profession's understanding of its mission has also expanded. The Indian Conference of Social Work (1957) emphasised fostering a full and meaningful life, while the joint definition adopted by the International Association of Schools of Social Work and the International Federation of Social Workers (2000) identified human rights and social justice as the profession's core pillars. The 2014 global definition further recognized social work as a profession that engages people and social structures to address life challenges and enhance wellbeing. Today, Social Work is widely acknowledged as a profession dedicated to empowerment, social transformation, sustainable development, improved quality of life, and the advancement of human rights and social, economic, and environmental justice.

India possesses a vibrant and extensive ecosystem of Social Work education, research, and practice. With more than 526 institutions offering social work programmes and approximately 120,000 students enrolled in undergraduate and postgraduate courses, the profession is well positioned to contribute meaningfully to national development. As India moves towards the vision of Viksit Bharat (Developed India) over the coming decades, social work has an increasingly important role in advancing the key pillars of national progress: inclusive growth and social justice, sustainable development, human development and wellbeing, good governance, and strong institutions.

Reimagining Social Work for Viksit Bharat requires the profession to embrace innovation, harness the transformative potential of technology, strengthen evidence-based interventions, and promote community-driven development. At the same time, these efforts must remain firmly grounded in the profession's enduring values of human dignity, social justice, democratic participation, equity, inclusiveness, and social responsibility. As both an academic discipline and a professional practice, social work plays a vital role in strengthening institutions, empowering communities, advocating for marginalized and vulnerable populations, and contributing to nation-building processes.

Through interdisciplinary collaboration, rigorous research, policy engagement, ethical practice, and social innovation, professional social work can serve as a catalyst for building a resilient, compassionate, equitable, and developed India.

Like every year, the Indian Social Work Conference (ISWC) provides a dynamic platform for dialogue, reflection, and deliberation on the evolving theoretical and practical dimensions of the profession. The conference seeks to critically examine emerging paradigms in social work and explore innovative approaches, strategies, and frameworks that can strengthen the profession's contribution to national development. It also aims to advance social work education, practice, research, and policy engagement, thereby enhancing the profession's capacity to support the vision of Viksit Bharat through inclusive, equitable, and sustainable development.

SUB-THEMES

The following sub-themes are designed to reflect the core areas of national development and the historical domains of social work practice:

- Social Work Education and Professional Excellence for Viksit Bharat; Addressing complex and emerging societal challenges, curriculum innovation, competency-based education, fieldwork transformation, professional ethics, accreditation, regulation, and continuing professional development; Professional Organisations for strengthening social work education; Professional standards in line with the aspirations of Viksit Bharat.

02. Social Work Education and Social Development in North Eastern States

- Growth of Social Work Education in NE States; Growing recognition of social work as a profession, its contribution to regional development, Challenges and opportunities for social work and interdisciplinary learning and practice.
- Contemporary Issues, Challenges, and Social Work Responses in North East India
- Aligning social work education with the goals of inclusive, sustainable, and culturally responsive development in the Northeastern region; Strengthening indigenous knowledge, community resilience, and Professional Social Work for inclusive development in North Eastern India

03. Education as key for Viksit Bharat

- Addressing the issues and rights of vulnerable communities: transgender rights, rights of persons with disability, and rights of ethnic minorities

- Sustainable Livelihoods; Employment generation and decent work opportunities; Self-employment, entrepreneurship, and micro-enterprises, Green jobs and sustainable economic opportunities; Social Protection, Poverty Reduction and Economic Inclusion.
- Work, Workers, and Workplaces-present and in viksit bharat; Decent Work and SDG-8; social entrepreneurship, corporate social responsibility, environmental, social and governance (ESG) frameworks, labour welfare, and community-based economic initiatives; CSR and social work profession.

09. Social Work and Global Perspectives

- Service delivery systems-opportunities and challenges; Artificial intelligence, digital inclusion, technology-enabled interventions, data ethics, and innovative service delivery models.
- Digital Social Work; Technology to improve social outcomes and expand access to services. Vibrant knowledge ecosystem that supports the goals of Viksit Bharat.
- Climate Action, Disaster Resilience, and Eco-social Work; Ecological sustainability, disaster preparedness and recovery, environmental advocacy, and eco-social approaches integrating social and environmental concerns in development practice.
- India's experiences, innovations, and indigenous approaches to social work; International Social Work-n perspectives and global challenges; Addressing South-South cooperation, localization of global development goals, knowledge exchange; and the role of Indian social work in shaping the future of the profession globally.

10. Building Bridges and Bridging Gaps

- Once an abstract is selected, the participant will be communicated to send across their full papers to the conference e-mail id. The last date of registration and submission of abstract is 5th August, 2026. A book of abstracts shall be published for the submission.
- The size of the full paper should be within 4000–5000 words with APA 7th referencing style. The abstract must be submitted through the online portal (<https://napswi.org/conf>) at the time of registration.
- The full paper should be in alignment with any of the sub-themes. The subject-line of the e-mail for submission of the full paper must mention the sub theme with which the paper aligns.
